International Beer Challenge



Swirling, sniffing, spitting, arguing: it's all in a day's work for an IBC judge. Nicola Collenette reports

host of beer aficionados, drinks journalists and other category experts judged this year's International Beer Challenge, organised by Off Licence News.

A total of 25 gold medals, 64 silvers and 127 bronzes were awarded to a diverse array of beers from around the world.

Seven tables of five to six judges blindtasted around 60 beers and scored them according to appearance, aroma and taste. Each panel discussed the results and debated whether the beers were of a standard worthy of a medal.

The best beers were re-tasted by a smaller group of judges, led by chairman Jeff Evans, and the trophy winners and overall winner will be revealed at an awards ceremony in London on September 12. The judging for the design and packaging of 48 international beers will take place on August 1 and winners will appear in OLN's August 19 issue.

Judge Alan Dunn, who runs convenience store Open All Hours in Keswick, Cumbria, said: "It was a tough job. But someone had to do it."

The list of medal winners includes breweries in Australia, the US and a wide range from the UK.


James Delap, director of Fyne Ales in Scotland, told OLN: "I'm delighted to have won two golds for the third year running. There are a lot of people discovering that modern British beer offers a lot more in terms of taste and flavour.

"Winning the IBC helps to draw people's attention to the quality of beers, which are worth venturing out of their way for."

Herefordshire-based brewery Wye Valley won a gold for its Dorothy Goodbody's Country Ale. Managing director Vernon Amor said: "We are delighted to have won a gold medal at the IBC. It is a big pat on the back to our brewers and marketing team who combine their talents perfectly with our Dorothy Goodbody range."

Tim Hampson, chairman of the British Guild of Beer Writers, praised the diversity of beers he judged on the day.

He said: "Overall, I thought the standard of entries was very high, reflecting the huge variety of beers which consumers can choose between. Long gone are the days



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when retailers only thought about stocking a continental lager, a British ale and an Irish stout. The market is now much more diverse and exciting. The spectrum of beer styles, tastes, flavours, colours and strengths make it a highly attractive and dynamic sector.

"For a beer to stand out in a series of blind tastings it has to be very, very good."

Judges also had some constructive advice for producers. Ben McFarland, director of dwink.com, said: "Producers should concentrate on the beer. The liquid is key. Tasting these beers blind means there is no marketing influence."

Blogger Steve Williams said he was a little

disappointed with the golden ale category but "generally other categories were strong". He encouraged more gluten-free beers to enter and suggested all producers state a temperature at which the beer should be served.

Beer writer Mark Dredge said: "We had some excellent beers this year. Very few were awful but many were too forgettable. The best beers stand out as being very good and there was an excellent mix of beers – but producers should only put beer forward if they are very confident of its taste and quality."

Technical sensory expert Kamini Dickie said: "Contrary to what people may think judging beer is a tough job – trying to balance the objective with the subjective. But the high standard of quality beers entered in the competition made it a little easier.

"Beer awards generate great interest in the beer category among customers and enhance UK trade for import and export markets. I commend OLN and Jeff Evans for supporting the IBC and making it happen."



Beer marketing consultant and judge Jeff Pickthall said: "It was a pleasure to participate, the broad range of styles covered makes the IBC the most interesting UK competition."


